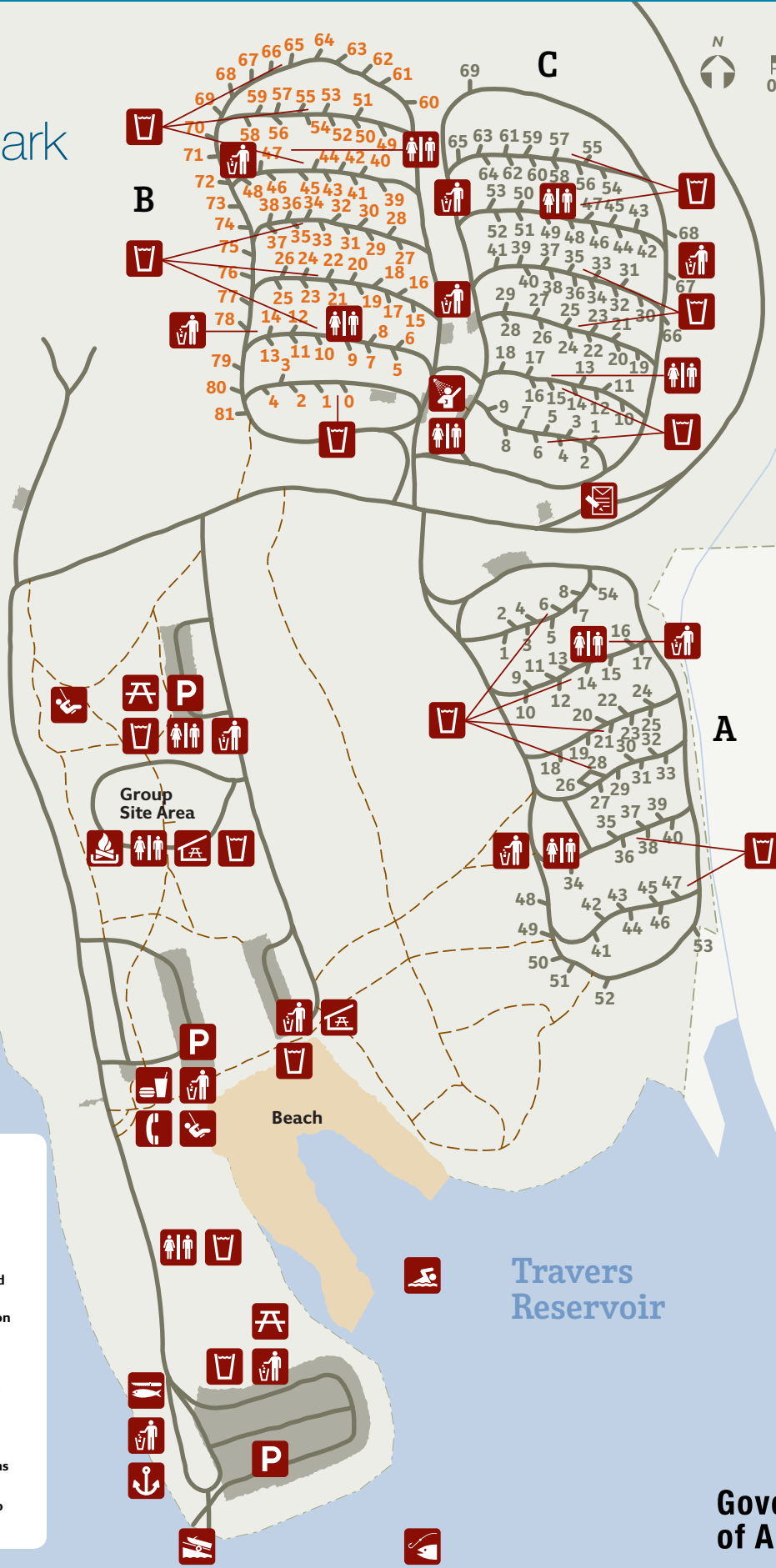

## Welcome to Little Bow Provincial Park

Enjoy the atmosphere and beauty of Travers Reservoir and the surrounding hills from the shade of the cottonwoods. Little Bow is an ideal setting for camping, boating, swimming, fishing, bird watching and picnicking.

*Nearby, Lake McGregor, Little Bow Reservoir and Travers Dam Provincial Recreation Areas have boat launches and day use facilities for your enjoyment.*

### SAFETY

- Follow safe boating regulations at all times.
- The beach has no lifeguard. Children must be supervised at all times.
- Beat the heat; stay hydrated and in the shade when possible, wear a sun hat, loose fit clothing and sunscreen.

### CAMPING

- Keep your campsite clean; recycling and garbage containers are available throughout the campground.
- The maximum number of motor vehicles, tents, RVs and trailers permitted on a campsite is three, of which only two may be used for sleeping quarters.
- Additional camping fees are charged for 2nd accommodation unit on a campsite unless 2nd accommodation unit is a tent and there is only one motor vehicle registered to the site.
- No more than six people may occupy a campsite, unless they are all members of a single family unit.
- Quiet time is from 11 pm to 7 am.
- Consider your neighbours; keep generator use to an absolute minimum and respect quiet times.

### PARKING

Park in designated parking areas or on the graveled portion of your campsite. Please do not park vehicles or trailers on the grass.

### PETS

Keep your pet on a leash, pick up after them and be sure they are supervised at all times. Pets are not

allowed in the swimming and beach area, washrooms, concession or other public buildings.

### WILDLIFE

Little Bow Provincial Park is located in the McGregor Lake and Travers Reservoir Important Bird Area. The peregrine falcon, an Alberta Species At Risk, has historically nested along the north shore of the western arm of Travers Reservoir. In spring and fall, watch for migrating birds in the cottonwoods along the reservoir. Fish species in the reservoir include brown trout, burbot, emerald shiner, lake whitefish, longnose sucker, northern pike, northern redbelly dace, rainbow trout, shorthead redhorse, spottail shiner, trout-perch, walleye, white sucker, and yellow perch.
